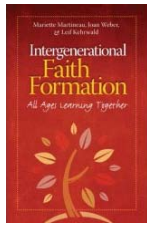


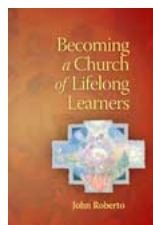
## ***Resources for Whole Parish Approach to Catechesis***

***Intergenerational Faith Formation: All Ages Learning Together*** by Mariette Martineau and Joan Weber, Twenty-Third Publications, 2008.

This is advertised as a companion to *Generations of Faith Resource Manual*, *Becoming a Church of Lifelong Learners* and *Families and Faith*. As do those resources, it looks at learning in an intergenerational setting, provides a case for this successful avenue of learning, explores some of the practices and the necessary elements for multigenerational learning, and shows how all ages can be integrated into the faith community. Chapter five details a basic learning format that can be applied and adapted to almost any parish situation.

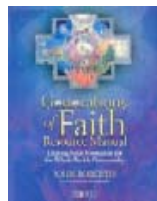


***Becoming a Church of Lifelong Learners*** by John Roberto, Twenty-Third Publications, 2006. The key in the Generations approach is that it builds on the strengths of a parish's current catechetical program. Yet it adds the critical component of lifelong learning that gathers all then generations to learn together and nurture faith through the life-cycle. The companion CD-ROM includes PowerPoint presentations for each chapter, along with articles by religious education theorists who have been instrumental in developing a new paradigm of lifelong faith

formation. The book is ideal for parish pastoral and catechetical leaders, as well as university courses in religious education and pastoral ministry

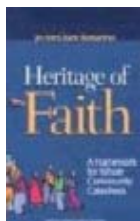

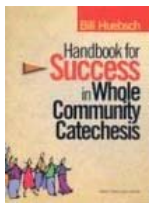

Specifically written to guide parish staffs and faith formation leaders, this resource offers planning processes and practical tools for fashioning and implementing a lifelong curriculum and developing leaders for lifelong catechesis.

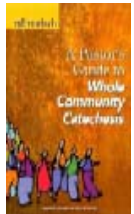

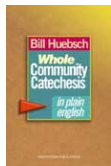

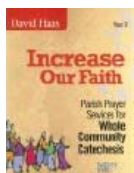
***A Pastor's Guide to Whole Community Catechesis*** by Bill Huebsch, Twenty-Third Publications, 2004. Bill Huebsch points out how this form of catechetical renewal can make a real difference in every parish. He shows that there is a solid basis for this approach in Church documents and recent movements within the Church. This book is an essential reference for every pastor in these days of rapid change, disillusionment with the Church, and confusion mixed with hope among God's people.



***Here Comes Everybody!: Whole Community Catechesis in the Parish*** by Leisa Ainslinger, Twenty-Third Publications, 2004. In this book, Ainslinger leads catechetical and pastoral leaders through implementation of whole community catechesis. Included are an explanation of its dimensions and elements, questions for reflection, planning processes for leadership groups, and ideas and samples of successful faith formation opportunities.



***Whole Community Catechesis in Plain English*** by Bill Huebsch, Twenty-Third Publications, 2002. Bill Huebsch offers concrete suggestions for a step-by-step process (the nuts-and-bolts) for implementing this catechetical model: linking liturgy and catechesis, making Christ the center of catechesis, focusing on the household, organizing assemblies and more. The appendices provide sample handouts, outlines for prayer and meetings, and organizational tools.



***Increase Our Faith: Parish Prayer Services For Whole Community Catechesis Year A*** by David Haas, Twenty-Third Publications 2004. Offers a comprehensive resource for intergenerational assemblies, community gatherings, parish meetings, and retreat days. These prayer services, written in the spirit of whole community catechesis, provide a service for each week of the liturgical year. Includes prayer, readings, question of the week for faith sharing and personal reflection, and litanies. Includes music and refrains by this well-known composer.

***Whole Community Catechesis: Bringing It All Home*** edited by author Bill Huebsch., Harcourt 2004. This compilation of articles on various aspects of whole community catechesis by leaders in the field including Kathleen Casey, Gaynell Cronin, Jane Deren, Steven Ellair, Jean Marie Hiesberger, Tom McGrath, Robert Piercy, Edith Prendergast, RSC, Reverend Jack Rathshmidt, and Nick Wagner. Topics include and overview of the whole community catechesis framework, liturgical integration, family, and community.
